## ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY:

Calgary Hadassah-WIZO, often referred to locally as Hadassah, was formed in 1921, soon after the Canadian affiliation of two women's social-activist groups; one American (Hadassah) and one British (Women's International Zionist Organization (WIZO)). The founding group of women included Rose Rabinovitz, (later known as Mrs S Jaffe), who served as President for the first four years; Marcia Goldberg, the group's first Secretary; Gertie Markus, and Sara Shnitka.

The organization grew steadily, with a group of "younger women and girls" forming a Junior Chapter, Tel Hai, in 1928. Israel Chapter was formed in 1949 (first President, Leah Saltman), and in order to avoid duplication of efforts and services the Hadassah Council of Calgary was organized in 1953, providing overall direction of activities; Sabra Chapter, which would later divide into afternoon and evening branches, followed in 1954 (President Ida Eichler). In addition to their own meetings and projects, all city chapters participated in joint programming and activities. Since the 1950s Calgary Hadassah Council has published regular newsletters -- variously titled *Hadassah Council, Calgary Hadassah Council Bulletin, Hadassah-WIZO Council of Calgary Bulletin, Hadassah-WIZO Council of Calgary News Bulletin, Hadassah News, News, Hadassah-WIZO Hi-Way, The Hadassah-WIZO World, Hadassah-WIZO Happenings,* and *Calgary Hadassah-WIZO Highlights* -- for distribution to the members of all chapters.

In 1961, with its membership reaching several hundred, Calgary Chapter was divided into 4 distinct chapters: Calgary, Orah (Rose Hector), Henrietta Szold (Miriam Dvorkin) and Queen Esther (Esther Gorosh). Later that same year Aliyah Chapter (Lil Groberman) was formed, as was Kadima Chapter (Ruth Lancaster), which was made up of young working women. Eleanor Roosevelt Chapter followed in 1965 (Gail Himelfarb). At any one time, Calgary Hadassah-WIZO has had upwards of 12 chapters, including Atid, Aviv, Chevra, EJI, Golda Meir, Havarot, Lily Frank, Marcia Goldberg, Moms and Tots, Shamayim, Tel Hai, Tikvah, Yonah and Zahev. While their start dates are generally noted in the records, some are only known through mention in the Bulletins or other general documents, and inactive chapters were often not formally dissolved. Several members of Calgary Hadassah-WIZO have taken on roles in the larger organization over the years, both Regionally (Gertie Markus, Ruby Smolensky ) and Nationally (Doreen Abugov, Lauren Bell, Ida Eichler, Marcia Goldberg, Sophie Kettner, Evgenya Knopov, Marilyn Libin, Sandy Martin, Sharon Sattin, Charna Shapiro, Ruth Ullman).

As a branch of a larger organization, the over-riding focus for Calgary Hadassah-WIZO's projects over the years has always been in the areas of health, education and welfare, particularly for Israeli women and youth of all backgrounds, regardless of race or religion. Fundraising for the various projects has taken many forms, including the catering and serving of suppers, event door admissions and small-cost raffles,

teas, card parties, theatrical revues, provincially-supported bingos and casinos, luncheons (including the very popular "Give or Get"), dime banks, donation cards, cookbooks, formal dinners and speakers, and a Food Zaar, which was a one-day event held from 1957-1959, selling handicrafts, 'White Elephant' items (gently used houseware) and traditional Jewish cooking and baking, as well as offering lunch and tea service. Two of the organizations longest-running fundraisers were the Medical Aid Tea and the Hadassah Bazaar.

The Medical Aid Tea began in 1945, with the specific goal of raising funds to purchase medical supplies that could be sent to Israel, where they were sorely needed. Calgary Hadassah members who were in the medical and allied professions, or whose husbands were, organized the first tea at the home of Ethel Libin, with Sybil Bercov acting as convenor. The following year, and until 1969, the tea was held at the home of Marcia Goldberg, and was often referred to as "Mrs. Goldberg's Tea". It was not unusual for upwards of 130 women to attend the event, which raised money by admission, raffle ticket sales and donations, with amounts ranging from \$891 in 1995, to over \$5000 throughout the 1980's. After 1969 various Hadassah members offered their homes for the tea, and in 1974, while still a city-wide event, its organization was taken over by Queen Esther chapter. In 1986 they were assisted by Aviv chapter, and from 1989 Aviv and Aliya chapters were the hostesses.

The single largest fundraiser organized by Calgary Hadassah-WIZO was the Hadassah Bazaar, first held in 1960 at the Mewata Armouries, on the pattern of Bazaars held in Toronto, Vancouver and Montreal. The event raised money for children, healthcare and women's organizations both locally and in Israel, through the sale of donated items, primarily used clothing and household goods, and foodstuffs made by the Hadassah women themselves. Each chapter took responsibility for its own booth or stand, and also contributed time and goods to the communal areas, like the bakery, dining areas and auction. The event quickly outgrew its original location, and in 1962, moved to the Big Four Building on the (Calgary) Stampede Grounds, where it remained for 25 years. Many thousands of people attended each year, and Hadassah members spent months organizing the donations, baking and cooking, using ingredient lists sufficient for 1600 cabbage rolls, or 3200 knishes. Funds raised by the Bazaar ranged from \$17,000 in 1966 to over \$87,000 in 1982. Despite its enormous success, 1985 was last year for the Hadassah Bazaar, as it was becoming increasingly difficult to organize and staff the mammoth event. It was replaced by Galleria, a higher-end affair that was held in 1986 and 1988, and subsequently by a number of smaller, though still highly-profitable events.

Calgary Hadassah-WIZO continues to support a wide range of projects including schools and hospitals, childcare facilities and playgrounds, colleges, scholarships and women's centres, both locally and in Israel. Some local projects and programming are undertaken as part of the organization's larger initiatives, such as the Youth Aliya project, one of Calgary Hadassah's longest running commitments. Their involvement with this project began in 1936, as the organization helped rescue Jewish children from Nazi Germany, resettling them in Hadassah-funded schools and residences in Israel. Post-war and into the 21<sup>st</sup> century, Youth Aliyah has continued to reach out to at-risk youth in Israel and around the world, often bringing in high-profile speakers and celebrities for its main annual event.

The fonds consists of minutes, financial statements and information, membership lists, correspondence, programming notes, cookbooks, event planning and publicity materials relating to the organization and activities of Calgary Hadassah-WIZO.
