

**TITLE:** Calgary Jewish Federation fonds

**ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY:**

The formation of the first Calgary Jewish community council was reported in a *Morning Albertan* article in April, 1911, which stated that aim of “The United Jewish Association of Calgary” was “ ... to unite all Jewish male members for their mutual welfare ... ”. The officers listed were A Bell (President) J Polsky, (Vice-president); S Goldberg (Secretary), H Margolis (Treasurer) and E Geffen, Chair of the Executive Committee. A notebook kept from 1912-1914, presumed to be community ledger, contains information about a *va’ad ha’ir* (community council), a *va’ad ha’kashrut* (committee for the oversight of kosher meat), and a *cheder* (parochial, after-school instruction).

In 1929, the House of Israel Association was incorporated, with the following aims: to promote religious and charitable work; provide instruction in Hebrew and Yiddish language, literature and history; establish and maintain libraries; offer public meeting and educational space; to support the intellectual, physical, spiritual activities of the community’s youth. Community fundraising was conducted through “combined appeals”, wherein donations were made into a pool that was then distributed among the participating organizations, including the schools and community building. By the late 1950s, annual fundraising efforts were focused for distribution under the umbrella of United Jewish Appeal (UJA).

In 1952, the Joint Jewish Administrative Office (JJAO) began operating out of the House of Israel community building, representing the Calgary Zionist Association, the Calgary Jewish Welfare Fund (later Jewish Family Service), Histadrut (a Zionist Labour Organization), and the House of Israel Association itself. JJAO was re-established as the Calgary Jewish Community Council (CJCC), which adopted a constitution in 1956 and elected Jack Edelson as founding President. By 1962 the House of Israel board of directors was replaced with representatives of some 20 Calgary Jewish organizations, and under President Morris Hector, CJCC hired its first full-time Executive Director, Harry Shatz.

In 2011, Calgary Jewish Community Council became an office of the newly-formed Calgary Jewish Federation – commonly called Federation -- part of Jewish Federations of Canada-UIA. CJCC and Federation were formally amalgamated in 2018. Working closely with partner agencies, Calgary Jewish Federation encourages affiliation, Jewish education and engagement throughout the local community, supporting the Calgary JCC, cultural events, parochial day schools, camps and Jewish Family Service Calgary. Many programs are focused on the vulnerable members of the community, including the elderly, children and adults with disabilities, and those facing poverty and hunger. In addition, Federation acts as an advocate on behalf of the Jewish community on domestic and social policy issues, and on Canada’s support for Israel.

At various times Calgary Jewish Federation / Community Council has overseen many community committees and councils, such as the Calgary Rabbinical Council (which oversees kosher food supervision and the community *mikvah* (ritual bath), and consults with the Chevra Kadisha (burial society) and the lay Religious Affairs Committee), the Council for Jewish Education, and the Holocaust Education and Remembrance Committee, which – in addition to community-wide commemorative events -- began sponsoring an annual Holocaust Symposium for high school students in 1984.

**SCOPE AND CONTENT:**

The fonds consists of minutes, correspondence, brochures and publicity material from Calgary Jewish Federation / Calgary Jewish Community Council.

The series consists of minutes and reports from Board, Committee and Annual General Meetings of Calgary Jewish Community Council, some of which include financial reports. Also included is a list of Calgary Jewish Community Council Presidents, 1956-1995.

The 1912-1914 notebook (Hebrew/ Yiddish / German), presumed to be a community ledger, contains financial records for *va'ad ha'ir* (community council) and the *va'ad ha'kashrut* (council for the oversight of kosher meat) as well as financial and enrollment information (names and fees) for a *cheder* (parochial, after-school instruction), and lists of community members.

Also included is correspondence and invoices regarding the kosher poultry plant, along with 5 *plumbas* [metal tags attached to certified-kosher poultry]. The poultry plant property was sold in 1980.

**ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY:**

United Jewish Appeal (UJA) was established in 1939 as a North American umbrella Jewish philanthropic organization, supporting Jewish individuals and communities in Europe and Palestine, as well as the United States and Canada.

By the late 1950s, UJA had been adopted by the Calgary Jewish community. Operating as the fund-raising arm of Calgary Jewish Federation / Community Council, [Calgary] UJA supports many community agencies and activities, such as Jewish Family Service Calgary, Calgary JCC, local parochial day schools, summer camps, and community educational initiatives. Monies are raised through various endeavours, such as gala dinners and concerts, in addition to the annual telephone solicitation drive, which attempts to reach every member of the local Jewish community.

The UJA Women's Division was launched in the early 1960s with the support of the Federation of Calgary Jewish Women's Organizations, who began holding an annual UJA luncheon in 1963. Beginning in the late 1970s, UJA's top female philanthropists have been recognized as "Lions of Judah".

[Calgary] UJA has also supported a wide range of charitable projects in Israel and around the world, including the re-settlement of Soviet Jewish immigrants during the 1970s. Emergency UJA campaigns, chaired by Maurice Paperny, followed the Six-Day War in 1967 and the Yom Kippur War in 1973. Long-term projects in Israel have included the 1987 Calgary Jewish community twinning with Mazkeret Batia in central Israel, and several community missions led there by Frank and Sophie Kettner, UJA and community leaders. "Partnership 2Gether" focused Calgary UJA support to the region of the Galilee Panhandle in northern Israel.

While remaining part of the founding organization, [Calgary] UJA continued to operate as "UJA" even after North American UJA merged with United Israel Appeal Inc and the Council of Jewish Federations in 1999 to form the United Jewish Communities, later The Jewish Federations of North America. From that time, the transfer of funds for overseas projects was handled by United Israel Appeal, which had come into existence in the 1920s as the fundraising arm of the Zionist movement.

**SCOPE AND CONTENT:**

The series consists of correspondence, pledge cards, event programs and publicity material, mailings, clippings, and a "2000-2001 Budget Allocation" document for Calgary United Jewish Appeal. Also included are booklets for the 1991 and 1992 tours to Mazkeret Batia and the 1995 "Alberta Mission to Israel", as well as promotional material (booklet, postcards, municipal crest) for Mazkeret Batia. Material from a 1972 scrapbook has been removed by the archives for preservation reasons, and placed in folders in its original order. Some material has been trimmed by the archives to reduce / remove glue residue.

**SCOPE AND CONTENT:**

The series consists of minutes and correspondence from the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations of Calgary. The Federation, created in 1962, included as many as five Hadassah chapters, three National Council of Jewish Women chapters and three Pioneer Women chapters, as well as the I.L.Peretz and Calgary Talmud Torah schools, and Beth Israel and Shaarey Tzedec synagogue Sisterhoods. Under founding president Clarice Chodak, the group launched the Women's Division of UJA, and through its annual conference (sometimes called Operation Open Mind) established the Opportunity School, which offered leadership training through such courses as public speaking and parliamentary procedure. The Federation compiled a directory for newcomers, which described each organization in the Jewish community.

The series consists of brochures and handbills for various Calgary Jewish Federation / Calgary Jewish Community Council education initiatives, including the Council for Jewish Education (CJEd) and The Florence Melton Adult Mini-School, as well as the Israel 101 lecture series. Also included is a program from a 2006 UJA National Women's Leadership Conference, co-sponsored by Calgary Jewish Community Council, and a 1974 "Tuition Fee Scale for Jewish Education in Calgary".

The series has been arranged chronologically: *Calgary Community Council Bulletin* (March? 1962); *Calgary Jewish News* (1962-1980); *Dor L'Dor* (1987-1995); *Report to the Community* (Jan? 2000); *Pomegranate* (Nov 2000, October 2002, December 2002, July 2005). *Pomegranate* became an online publication, *e-Pom*, in 2014, and there is a Federation / *Pomegranate* section regularly included in the *Jewish Free Press*.

All iterations are presumed incomplete. A more complete set of photocopied *Calgary Jewish News* issues (1962-1985) is available to researchers through the JHSSA office.
